

Targeted Case Management

- A consumer driven program which promotes and coordinates quality services and supports for consumers for the purpose of developing positive outcomes.
- A service provided by an individual whose role is to advocate on behalf of the consumer and facilitate access to public and private resources.
- An entitlement program for those who receive Medicaid, have a qualifying diagnosis and unmet needs.

Who is eligible for Targeted Case Management?

- Those with a diagnosis of a Chronic Mental Illness, Mental Retardation / Intellectual Disability, Developmental Disability, a Brain Injury or the Elderly.
- Those who are 18 years and older or who are children eligible to access ID or BI Waiver Services.
- Those who receive Medicaid (TXIX).
- Those who desire to participate in a plan to establish and work toward personal goals.

How may I access Targeted Case Management Services?

- Contact Community Services and complete a Community Services Application.

Central Point of Coordination

- The administrative entity designated by the Franklin County Board of Supervisors to determine eligibility for and coordination of mental health and disability service funding per the county management plan, as required in sections 331.439 and 331.440, Iowa Code.
- The service and cost tracking system for all services and supports to be paid through the MH/DD Services Fund.
- The educational component responsible for providing information to consumers, families, providers, public and the legal system to develop a coordinated service delivery which is consumer responsive.

County Managed Care

County managed care is management of county funds used to provide quality and meaningful mental health and disability services to eligible consumers. Services and supports that are necessary and appropriate are delivered in the least restrictive setting, in the least intrusive manner, and are monitored by Community Services staff.

Managed Care seeks to balance three factors:

- 1 Achieve high quality outcomes for consumers
- 2 Coordinate access to services and supports
- 3 Contain costs within the established county MH/DD Services Fund

Who is eligible for County Managed Care?

- Those living in Franklin County or having legal settlement in Franklin County who are legal citizens of the United States.
- Those with a primary diagnosis of mental illness, mental retardation, or developmental disability.
- Those meeting income and resource guidelines.
- Those court ordered to receive mental health evaluations.

General Assistance

- A program funded by county tax payer dollars to meet basic necessities of life on an emergency one time basis for poor or needy residents of Franklin County.
- A program with financial and resource guidelines.

How may I access General Assistance?

- By contacting Community Services and completing a Community Services Application.

Substance Abuse Funding

- Court-ordered substance abuse treatment services may be available contingent on established eligibility criteria.
- County funding for voluntary substance abuse treatment services may be available if qualifying conditions are met.

How may I access services and supports?

- By completing a Community Services Application for review by Community Services staff.
- Through court ordered mental health treatment.
- By referral of counselors, providers, family members, social workers, case managers, hospitals, physicians, or law enforcement to Community Services for eligibility determination.
